Concept Note

Manipur has a rich and complex history dating back thousands of years. The region was originally ruled by several small tribes before the Ningthouja dynasty emerged as the dominant power in the first century AD. King Nongda Lairen Pakhangba (33 AD) is credited with unifying the valley and establishing the Meitei kingdom, which later expanded its influence over neighboring regions

Manipuri literature, deeply rooted in the cultural and historical ethos of Manipur, is an essential part of India's literary heritage. Over centuries, it has evolved from oral traditions to a refined written form, incorporating folklore, poetry, prose, and modern literary expressions. Though largely confined to regional readership for much of its history, Manipuri literature has significantly contributed to world literature by showcasing unique narratives, aesthetics, and philosophies that transcend geographical boundaries. The Khamba Thoibi epic and Numit Kappa, a mythological work, reflect deep philosophical and ethical values. The introduction of writing in the Meitei Mayek script further strengthened its literary base. With the arrival of Vaishnavism in the 18th century, a new era of literary development began, incorporating Hindu mythology into Manipuri storytelling, as seen in Govindagi Gita and Bamon Khunthok. Major Contributions to World Literature Manipuri folklore, epics, and ballads contribute to global literary heritage by offering unique insights into indigenous storytelling techniques, oral history, and myth-making. Manipuri drama and theatre, especially those rooted in Ras Lila and Shumang Leela, have influenced performance literature worldwide. The works of playwrights like Arambam Samarendra are known for their fusion of realism and traditional storytelling. By continuing efforts in translation, research, and global literary exchanges, Manipuri literature can further enrich global literary landscapes, bringing the voices and stories of Manipur to a wider audience.

The seminar invites critical contributions on the mentioned theme from interested academics, research scholars and students. A multi disciplinary approach to the above discourse is highly appreciated.
